I am pleased to say these parties will be properly reinstated once the new Quarterdeck extension, (east of the gallery and overlooking the outdoor swimming pool) is completed next year. Providing more ground floor space and a splendid room for cocktail parties, private dining, bridge, wine tastings, it could be best described as a room for small parties. Sadly (or gladly) it is not a "function suite" for weddings or conferences – a ghastly corporate term alien to a country house. The lady who dared suggest this has since apologised, rinsed her mouth with soap and water, and was subsequently enlightened with a glass of Champagne! Perhaps just a party room after all?

The Whittington Suites - (not) opened January 2021



It was billed as the lockdown party of the year. Boris may disagree. Nevertheless, to hold a launch party to open the Whittington Suites in January '21 was a challenge when one could not even legally visit The Nare. So, when needs must, an online Zoom party was thrown for 200 guests from Britain and around the world. Dame Judi Dench, with her usual charm very obligingly opened the suites. She was assisted by Cordelia and Georgiana Ashworth revealing plaques to their great and great-great grandmothers, Bettye and Olive Whittington respectively. Floor plans were printed on the back of wallpapers used in the suites to accompany the invitation. Taittinger and smoked salmon was delivered to guests that morning so that they could join in from home, mingling in small Zoom chat groups after a filmed conducted tour.

The Nare is renowned for providing guests with a high standard of comfort unrivalled in the South West. For several years there has been a requirement to relocate and to provide better staff accommodation. After an abortive start caused by lockdown the former industrial units were demolished to allow for private single and double ensuite apartments. The building programme was completed in early 2022.

Jago House, located in Tregony five miles from the hotel, is home to approximately 20 staff. A car sharing scheme was introduced to help staff get to work.



The Gatehouse was an important part of improving the approach to the hotel. It was built using granite and Delabole slate. The first floor contains a meeting/training room with a workshop underneath allowing the bin yard to be relocated to the recycling yard. Dan uses an electric buggy to transport the refuse to the top of the hill.

Electric Vehicle Charge

The Nare may be deliberately traditional and old-fashioned but it is also subtly progressive where eco strategy is concerned. Toby Ashworth has always been rather cynical of ineffective gimmicky greenwash gestures that other hotels use for PR purposes and prefers to devise “deep-green” environmentally effective and appropriate solutions that make a genuine difference. Otherwise known as ‘Econitiatives’ - the art of genuine eco-friendly and economically viable initiatives (another of his off-the-wall inventions). Fondly referred to as The Nare’s ‘resident engineer’, he has improved on a scheme to recover heat from the water cooled fridges, wine cellars, and air-con units to preheat the hotel hot water supply. It is now enhanced with the addition of a ground source heat pump to chill the cold-water circuit and boost the heat.

During last summer’s heat wave it was working so well that the recovered heat exceeded the hotel demand and excess heat had to be dumped at 55°C into the outdoor pool. With some further tweaks, the aim is to switch off the oil fired boilers completely in the summer months by using the outdoor pool as a thermal battery.



The environmental dilemma of disguising ten ugly white electric vehicle charging stations in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty was overcome by hiding them amongst the Millennium tree plantation, and perhaps laying claim to being one of the best sea view car parks in the country. There’s no fee for residents charging their cars provided they return the key fob – it costs more to replace than an overnight charge.
